Joseph, the faithful and just husband

As we approach Christmas, it is natural to reflect on the human elements behind this grand celebration of our salvation mystery. Throughout the liturgical year, we don't focus on the virtues of St. Joseph as we do on those of our Blessed Mother, yet both sacrificed greatly for their God-given son, Jesus Christ. Today's gospel depicts Joseph as a good, just, and faithful husband and foster father to Jesus.

Joseph's betrothal to Mary meant they were legally married, although their marriage had not been consummated. It was shameful for Mary to be found pregnant when they had not slept together. In Deuteronomy 22:23-24, the penalty for adultery was death by stoning at the door of her father's house, as she had brought disgrace to her father.

Since Joseph was a just man full of mercy, he decided to divorce Mary quietly to avoid causing her unnecessary pain. In doing so, he shows us Christ-like compassion in the face of sin. He also demonstrates a Godly balance between the Law of Torah and the Law of Love. Then, in a dream, he learned that the Holy Spirit had conceived the Child and that he was to be the foster father of Christ, claiming the Child by naming Him and then raising Him. Joseph, through trust and faith in God, accepted his mission as the foster father of the Son of God. Without his calm, thoughtful, and just disposition, it would have been impossible for Joseph to hear and obey God's inspiration.

Like Joseph, we must trust in God, listen to Him, and stay faithful. We are gathered in this Church, four days before Christmas, because, like Joseph, we are loyal and trust in God's power and mercy. Though we may face financial struggles, job insecurity, family issues, and health concerns, let us strive to be trusting and faithful like St. Joseph. Instead of relying on our own plans to get us through life, let us trust in God and find strength through fervent prayer and by listening to Him speak through the Bible. Let us stay faithful and prayerful, following the example of Joseph and Mary—humble, kind, and the greatest believers in God's goodness and mercy—as we welcome Jesus into our hearts and lives this Christmas.

Let's check if Jesus is on our list this Christmas and if we have a special gift in mind for Him. We all know the joy of finding the perfect present for our husband or wife, children, a good friend, or a parent. What special gift are we giving to Jesus this year to honor His birth, and what do we expect from God? God sent Jesus from Heaven to earth to provide us with what we genuinely need most in life: hearts filled with love. That is the gift Jesus truly wants from us, and that's what you and I really need from God this Christmas – a heart filled with love. We have many wants. We're like children with a catalog before Christmas, circling all our desires by the dozens. But we have one essential need: a heart filled with love. God wants to give each of us a heart filled with love, mercy, compassion, and forgiveness this Christmas and every day of our lives.

The greatest gift we can give to those we love is to trust in them, believe in their good dreams, and try to help make those dreams come true. We need to believe in the good dreams of our husbands, wives, children, parents, heroes, leaders, and friends, and then do our best to help them achieve those dreams.
